From the Editor's Chair-

How does one define a generation?

I for one am tired of hearing the many generalizations made about the "Baby Boomers." It is so clear, especially after watching our political debates, that "we" are not simply a category of single-minded souls all going in one direction. Or even two (as in the "red" states, and the "blue" states).

It may be more appropriate to define us by our fears.

Beyond that, I have noticed that from time to time, a bunch of us can indeed all get together in a unified whole, setting aside our differences, and appear to be monolithic. And sure enough, when that happens, someone will want to put a label on us and call us a collective "something".

It took me a long time to become comfortable with the label "nudist." Labels are appropriate as long as people want to identify with them. I am a "nudist" if by that you mean free to choose to wear clothing, or not. Much of the time I prefer not to, but my bare skin is not a badge! One such phenomenon began 40 years ago this month, when a certain Concert celebrating "Peace, Love, and Music" *Happened* on some farmland in upstate New York.

And it was a "happening"!

But right away some began to describe the "Woodstock Generation" as if there were something about the event that we all subscribed to, or could be defined by.

There were some striking things about Woodstock that made the event unique. And I'm not talking about the nudity!

It stood in stark contrast to the time in which it took place. The 60's were a period of contrasts and conflicts. There was the war in Viet Nam; As well as the anti-war movement. There were the Assassinations of two Kennedy brothers, one of whom happened to be president of the United States. There was the Assassination of Martin Luther King, Jr. There was the violence of the 1968 Democratic Convention, and (after Woodstock) Kent

In contrast to all of this, Woodstock was about "Peace, Love, and Music." There was no violence.

But how can this one event define a generation?

Half a million people converged on this farm in New York. The promoters had expected about 80,000 people. The Plans forFood and Sanitation, as well as the roads in and out, could not accommodate the crowd. Yet the crowd did not riot; they were peaceful! Somehow, it all came together.

The crowd practiced tolerance, as well as the slogans. "Peace, Love, and Music."

You did not have to be there, to appreciate the *happening*.

It is said that only half a million people were there, but 10's of millions have seen the movie and wish they had been there.

I wasn't there. As most of you know, my life after high school was one of being cloistered in a religious cult. I was probably one of those, living the kind of life, which the "hippies" had rejected.

And even when I saw the movie, I did not wish that I had been there, but I felt connected to the feelings of the moment..

The significance of Woodstock is not universally felt by whatever you want to call my generation.

One wise observer was quoted as saying that it wasn't a generation-defining moment, but it was simply a *moment*: a point in time.

We have had a taste of this here at LARC this summer. The Critical Massive folks were here to celebrate their brand of Peace, Love, Music and Art. And they left, after their "moment," without marring the landscape. The only mark they made was in our appreciation for who they are.

The Rock n the Park Concert took place, and left warm feelings in many of us.

Peace, Love, and Music happens!

We watch every year for their arrival and with it we know that summer has finally come to the Pacific Northwest!! Their color is vivid and the purest yellow you will ever see. They are quite, unassuming birds that are a delight to watch.

Unlike the Jays, which are in a category all their own. You either "like 'em" or "dislike 'em". They are aggressive, full of tricks and mimicry. Jay's have a well deserved reputation as bullies. They are notorious for chasing other birds from feeders and gobbling up feed as much as they can hold. Looking past all of that, they are still very beautiful in their color.



They always send one look out bird in to scan the area and he looks around bobbing his head here and there and then all of a sudden twelve to thirty or more will arrive. They all try to fit onto one bird feeder and eventually all you will see is a squirming mass of birds trying to keep their footing. Make one little bit of noise and the whole flock flies off with a loud whoosh of wings.

We have identified over thirty varieties of birds. Pileated woodpeckers, northern flickers, grosbeaks, towhees and juncos are just a few. Early mornings on the patio with a good cup of coffee and my bird friends is the best way to start the day. Their beauty enriches our lives and our garden. Lounge in your favorite chair and enjoy the endless beauty that surrounds us here on our beautiful grounds at LARC.
